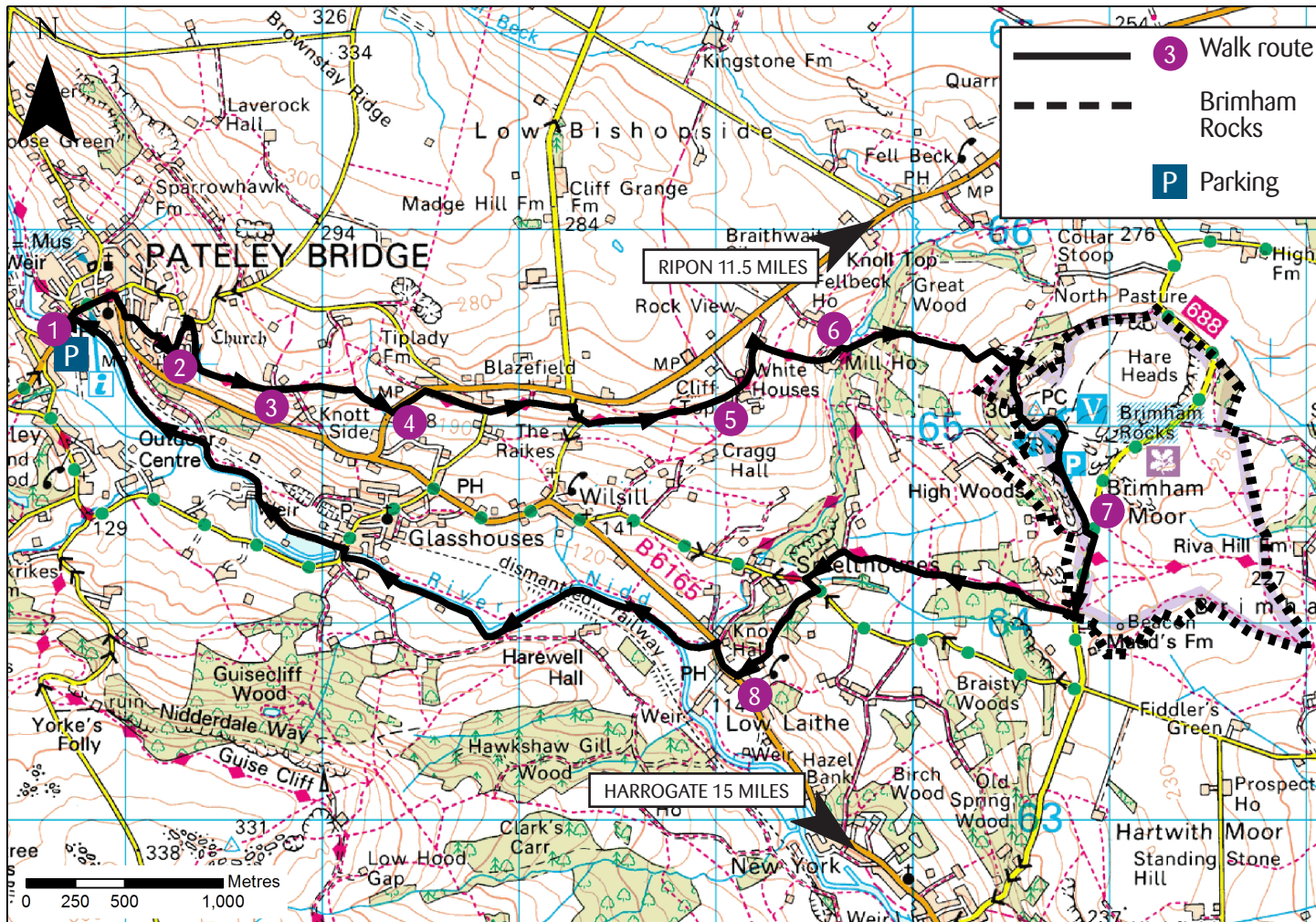




Pateley Bridge Circular, via Brimham Rocks

Introduction

Starting from the pretty market town of Pateley Bridge this varied walk passes through Brimham Rocks – amazing geological formations approximately 320 million years old before dropping down into Low Laithe. The route passes through woodland and rolling fields, providing delightful views across the valley. The walk is 9 miles long and should take about 4 to 5 hours but you can take as long as you want exploring Brimham Rocks.

Starting Point

The centre of Pateley Bridge at the river bridge (SE 157655).

Terrain

The gradient is moderate to steep in places and the terrain varies including woodland paths, gravelled tracks and fields.

Useful Information

Pay & Display parking is available in Pateley Bridge.

There is a regular bus service to Pateley Bridge from Harrogate (Transdev Harrogate & District No.24). There are also several other bus services running to Pateley Bridge. Visit www.dalesbus.org for more information.

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The Route

Please note that this is an overview of the route and walkers should use an OS Explorer Map (298) in addition to plan their walk.

1. From the High Street head up hill. Follow the road round to the right (along Ripon Road) and then turn left onto a public footpath (just past the Methodist Church). Carry on up the hill passing Bishopdale House on the left.

2. OPTIONAL DETOUR: Just past Bishopdale House you can turn left up some stone steps and take a short detour to the ruins of Old St Mary's Church, rejoining the hill further up. Alternatively you can continue straight up the hill at this point.

3. At the top of the hill you will reach a small cluster of houses. Continue straight on along the road (signposted Public Bridleway Blazefield) for about 30 yards. Where the road bends to the right, take the track to the left signposted 'Hole House'. Follow this path; at the junction continue round to the right and down the hill.

4. At the end of the path, where it meets the road, turn left and walk up the road for a short distance. Turn right on to a footpath going behind a row of houses. At the road turn left

and carry straight on re-joining the footpath as the road curves to the left. Walk along this path to the end then turn right onto the road. Walk down the hill then turn left on to the footpath going over the stile.

5. Go through a gate and straight on over a crossroads, past White Houses. Continue on this path and turn right just before a row of houses. Walk down the side of the house and then down through the fields following the way markers. Go over another stile and walk down the field to the cattle grid and gate. Go through the gate and follow the path round to the right, then turn left onto a footpath.

6. You will cross over a small footbridge then take the left fork and carry on along the path. Follow this path uphill eventually passing a dwelling on your left. The stile past the dwelling takes you into National Trust land where you are free to explore the rock formations. If you climb up the hill you will join the main path, turning right will take you to the Visitors Centre.

7. At the main entrance turn right down the road. After half a mile join a bridleway on the right signposted to Smelthouses. This gated bridleway will eventually take you to a track

where you turn left going downhill into Smelthouses. As you join the road turn left and walk along the road for a short while until you come to a bridleway on the right. Follow this bridleway downhill into Low Laithe.

8. Going onto the road turn right and follow the road out of the village. Outside the village and on the left a footpath will take you off the road and down to the River Nidd via a small bridge over a tributary. Once by the river walk upstream until you come to a footbridge. Cross the bridge and proceed upstream the path will eventually reach a road where you will turn right over a bridge. After the bridge and on the left join a path that follows the line of a track by the side of Glasshouses Dam. Follow the path along the river back into Pateley Bridge.

Features of interest

Brimham Rocks

Owned by the National Trust, this amazing collection of weird and wonderful rock formations is scattered over 50 acres of moorland and can be explored via a labyrinth of paths. Brimham Rocks enjoy spectacular views over the surrounding countryside and provide a great family day out. Facilities include a visitor centre, shop and a refreshment kiosk. Some paths are suitable for wheelchair users.

Open: Rocks - daily (8am to dusk) all year round. Visitor Centre & Refreshment Kiosk - opening times vary. please check website for details.

Prices: Admission is free but there is a charge for car parking.
